



Violet E. Johnson

Violet E. Johnson has contributed much to the advancement of our club's activities. I have tried to glean from her some of her past that would be of interest to our members.

Born on August 17, 1906 in Rose Town Hennepin County, Minnesota, she was the only daughter of Lars Christian Jensen (changed to Christ Johnson when he emigrated to America from Denmark), and Wilhemina Brunn (changed to Brown when she also came to this country from Denmark).

Violet had two brothers, which gave her an alibi for being a tomboy. The children attended schools in Eden Valley and Crow River, Minnesota. After seven years of class-room work, Vi took the eighth grade exams and passed with flying colors. By doing housework she worked her way through business college in Minneapolis. In working her way west, she stopped off in Billings Montana to do catering for social affairs. It was at this time she first became interested in photography, and during this time she not only learned how to press the button, but also to do her own processing and to make her own en-

Moving to Washington on November 1, 1941, Vi began to work for Frank Byerly, who was a tourism photographer for the State of Washington. After Pearl Harbor, his contract was canceled and so was Vi's job. It wasn't long until Mr. R. J. Young, owner of The Home Portrait Studio, hired Vi to be his "Gal Friday". She began at the bottom, Developing film. The only processing she had done previously was one roll at a time in a bowl. Her first night on the new job was a long one as she developed four hundred and eighty (480) rolls of

From this she progressed to printing and enlarging. Vi remained with The Home Portrait Studio for the next eight years, followed by four years with Mrs. Julien of Julien's Studio, and the next

eighteen years with Bob Benson of Benson's Camera Shop.

Looking back, Vi says "when I applied for work at Bob's, he said he didn't have enough work to hire anyone, so I twisted his arm and told him, he needed me". She got hired for two days a week in his studio, picking beans and strawberries between times until he hired her full time that fall. Retiring officially in 1970, she continued to work full time for nine more years.

As for hobbies, Vi says she has skied on barrel staves, ice skated among muskrat houses on the sloughs, and tobogganed many a chute. Later she joined The Mountaineers and has climbed many mountains and hiked many a trail.

Another love is fishing, so if you need to know how to bait a hook see Vi. Now her main hobby is photography, especially wild flowers.

Vi is a charter member of the Pilchuck Camera Club. A long time member of the Mountaineers, where she made barrels of coffee for more than 20 years at their annual salmon barbecues. She is also an active member of Wildflower Acres, Pilchuck Audubon Society and the NWCCC.

She was the first recipient of the Nell Pierce Memorial Award (1970) and the first woman to win the Slide of the Year Plaque (1974), and Vi has earned a total of 7378 points in the Pilchuck Camera Club's monthly competitions.

Sixten "Sag" Anderson was born at Montbourne, Washington (the town no longer exists), at the north end of Big Lake in Skagit County.

This past year he took a trip to Farilä, Sweden to visit the homeland of his parents George and Margaret Pierson Anderson. His two younger sisters are Martha (Mrs. William) Eaton of Everett and Vilma (Mrs. Claude) Williamson of San Diego, California. Sag has many fond memories of attending the old Garfield and Central schools in Everett.

On November 29, 1934 he and Pearl Elizabeth Reedy were joined in wedlock. Their daughter Sharon (Mrs. Robert) Metal lives in Lynnwood and son Ron (wife, Mary) live in Dutch Harbor, Alaska. Sharon and Bob gave them their two grandchildren.

During WW2 Sag worked in the Bremerton Shipyard and then later at the Everett Marine Ways. After leaving that job he worked as a cabinet maker, becoming one of the best in the country.

She and Albert "Cap" Doph were married on March 28, 1918. Four children, ten grandchildren and 8 great-grand children brings her family roll-call up to date. Her interest in photography began when Cap gave her an Eastman camera on their fifth wedding anniversary.

During the busy years of raising a family she taught Campfire Girls and High School classes in swimming at the YMCA. She held Red Cross Life Saving Instructor and Life Saving Service Certificates.

Adelsa joined the Mountaineers in 1945. During the following years of hiking, back packing and camping, she always carried a camera, photographing not only the scenery but nearly every kind of wild flower along the way.

After the passing of her husband in 1957, she found it necessary to return to secretarial work, this time at the Monroe Reformatory, retiring in 1966.

As a June 12, 1964 charter member of our club, Adelsa was the chairman of the by-laws committee. This foundation she helped form is still the same one that we use today.



A PILCHUCKER VIGNETTE

Ivan & Frieda Mercer



Ivan Mercer, a Charter Member of the Pilchuck Camera Club, was born July 29, 1897 in Philomath, Oregon. The second of three boys. He attended grade school in Oregon. In 1912 the family moved to Stanger, Alberta, Canada where his father took up a homestead. When Ivan was 17 years of age he took up a homestead of 160 acres and also bought 60 more acres, paying three dollars per acre. Ivan worked in a small portable sawmill for three or four winters for room and board plus one or two dollars a day for a ten hour day. Ivan also had a government mail contract to deliver mail from the train to the post office twice a week, a distance of eight and a half miles for twenty dollars per month. He kept this route for eight years, using a horse and wagon to make the delivery.

During the depression, Ivan sold wheat for 21¢ per bushel, and it cost him 8¢ per bushel to get it thrashed, he also sold eggs for 3¢ a dozen.

In 1937 after his entire wheat crop froze, he sold the farm for three dollars an acre and moved back to Philomath, Oregon to help his uncle with farming. A year later Ivan moved to Everett and worked at various jobs in the Hulbert sawmill for five years and in a cabinet shop for a year. In 1942 he took a job with the Everett Pulp and Paper Mill in Lowell (later called the Simpson Paper Company) retiring in 1962.

Ivan has been the Club Historian since July 22, 1965. Treasurer, 1979, 1980 and 1981. He has judged at the club's monthly competitions numerous times. Ivan received the Nell Pierce Memorial Award (Service Award) in 1977. In February 1980 he received an award certificate for 1500 accumulated points earned in the Club's monthly slide com-

THE YEAR was 1951... Ivan needed a new car, Follestad Motors in Everett had just the one he had been looking for. Frieda Vogel was the bookkeeper for the firm. Ivan says "When I bought the car they threw Frieda in as a bonus. Best deal I ever had." (this was before factory rebates, too) They were married on August 18, 1951, and purchased their home on Beverly Boulevard and have made their home there since.

Frieda Vogel was born February 3, 1911 in Delmont, South Dakota, the 7th in a family of ten children. When just a baby, her folks moved the family to a farm in Twin Bridges, Montana. Her father purchased this farm, but after putting up with extremely cold winters the family decided to move to the State of Washington, settling on a farm near Snohomish. Frieda graduated from the Snohomish High School in 1929 and worked at numerous jobs during the depression doing housework. In 1943 she again went to school, this time at the Rogers Business College and in 1944 started to work for Follestad Motors and continued to work there for 29 years, retiring in 1973.

Frieda joined the Pilchuck Camera Club as an Associate Member in 1973 and became a Regular Member in 1980. During

this time she was assistant to the Club Historian and in 1981 she was elected Treasurer, and reelected in 1982.

Frieda's hobbies are candle making and drift-wood sculpture. Each summer she and Ivan plant a large garden and maintain a beautiful yard. They are members of Immanuel Luthern Church of Everett and Frieda is a member of the Ladies Aid Society of that Church.

PHOTO TIPS

Before going out in the freezing weather, clean your tripod legs and locks, and wipe them sparingly with light oil so they will not stick.

If your camera or light meter batteries are old, replace them. Batteries are weaker in cold weather than in warm weather.

Do not rely on your exposure meter to meter a snow scene directly, or you will overexpose. Instead, meter on a gray card or the palm of your hand held vertically. Use the gray card reading without compensation, but open up one f stop if you meter on your hand.

Advance your film slowly. Advancing it rapidly in cold or otherwise dry air can give you lightning-like streaks on your film caused by generating static electricity.

Carry your camera under your coat to keep it as warm as possible.

Before going indoors from freezing temperatures with a cold camera, wrap it in a plastic bag and seal it with a twist tie. After you take it indoors, the moisture will condense on the inside of the bag instead of on the inside of the camera and lens.



Pearl Daughterty from Missouri and Oscar Smith from Kentucky were married in Hatton, Washington. their first home was on land that was homesteaded by Oscar. The deed to the homestead, dated 8 November 1900, was signed by President Theodore Roosevelt.

Bessie Pearl Smith was born December 10, 1907 at Hatton (this is near Ritzville in eastern Washington). She was the third child in a family of eleven children. The family moved extensively due to the father's ill health. In 1909, the family moved to Junction City, Oregon, where they had their own photographic studio. Bessie was of a young age when she acquired her first camera, a one dollar box camera. Photography has been a natural hobby for her.

A graduate from the Yakima Business College, Bessie worked in a life insurance office in Spokane, transferred to Yakima and then to San Francisco, California, then back to Yakima to work for a while in a fruit office. In 1940 she went to work for the Navy as an accountant, in Bremerton, then Indian Island and in Seattle. In 1952 she changed services — this time to the Airforce at Paine Field, Everett, Washington. She continued working at Paine Field until her retirement in 1968.

In 1953 she began the hobby of photography in earnest, with a Retina 3C, then later a Pentax and now she has advanced to an Olympus OME?.

Bessie and her mother were two of the Charter Members who helped form the Pilchuck Camera Club on June 12, 1964.

Bessie has held numerous offices and served on many committees in the Club. Historian - 1966; Treasurer - 1967 and 1970; Color Director - 1971; Hospitality - 1972; Secretary - 1974, 1977, 1978, 1979 & 1980; Field Trips - 1976 and 1977; Social - 1977; President - 1983 & 1984.

In 1976 she received the Nell Pierce Memorial Award for service to the Pilchuck Camera Club and to amateur photography.

Bessie has been very active in club photographic competitions since the formation of the club. She received an Achievement Award Certificate for 5500 points earned in club competition at the Club's Slide of the Year Banquet held on February 25, 1984.







SLIDE OF THE YEAR JUDGES

The judges for the Pilchuck Camera Club's 17th annual Slide of the year competition were Irene F. Dye, FPSA, Dr. W. Wayne Lockwood, APSA, and Wayne Dye of Spokane.

Irene is a five star exhibitor in Nature, is Chairman of the Inland Empire Chapter, PSA, an International Salon judge and has presented programs at PSA International and local conventions. Dr. Lockwood is also a five star exhibitor and is one of the few photographers to hold a PSA Photographer Naturalist Award.

Wayne Dye, is a salon exhibitor and judge.

In case some of the titles etc., are somewhat confusing to non-PSA types, here is a brief road map.

APSA stands for Associate, Photographic Society of America.

FPSA stands for Fellow, Photographic Society of America. To receive these honors, which are for service to PSA and photography, a member is elected by an Honors Committee of the Society.

Star Ratings. Star ratings are awarded to members who have had certain numbers of pictures accepted in international exhibitions which meet the requirements for PSA recgonition.

The Color Slide Division requirements are: 1 star, 30 acceptances with a minimum of 6 slides; 2 star, with 80 acceptances with 16 slides; 3 star, 160 acceptances with 32 slides: 4 star, 320 acceptances with 64 slides; 5 star, 640 acceptances with 128 slides. Galaxy Awards: 1 to 7, 25 new slides with 4 acceptances each; 8th 50 new slides with 8 acceptances; 9th, 75 new slides with 8 acceptaces; 10th, 100 new slides with 8 acceptances; 11th, 125 new slides with 8 acceptances each.

The Nature Division: Stars are awarded for either slides or prints in recognized nature exhibitions. 1 star, 18 acceptances with a minimum of 6 pictures; 2 star, 36 acceptances with 12 pictures; 3 star, 73 acceptances with 24 pictures; 4 star, 144 acceptances with 48 pictures; 5 star, 288 acceptances with 96 pictures; diamond star, 640 acceptances with 192 pictures.

Photographer naturalist (post diamond) 50 fairly restricted pictures, each accepted twice in nature exhibitions.

NELL PIERCE MEMORIAL AWARD

James D. Geniesse, received his permanent Nell Pierce Memorial Award from Edwin E. Erickson, APSA, at the February 23, 1985, Pilchuck Camera Club's Annual Banquet. 





HIGH ACHIEVER

Beryl McCollum becomes the first Pilchuck Camera Club member to amass ten thousand (10,000) points in club color slide competition.

Beryl joined the Pilchuck Camera Club on January 14, 1965. During the ensuing twenty one years of club competitions, she has been a fierce competitor in the monthly inter-club contests, winning many ribbons and certificates along the

The Achievement Award Certificate is received for each 500 point increment in points received from the eleven monthly club slide competitions held each year. Each of the three slides submitted for the contest that receives between 20 and 30 points as scored by three judges, and one alternate, is counted toward the Achievement Award. This means that the total score received each month is somewhere between 60 and 90 points (there never has been a total monthly score over 75 points in the club).

To accumulate 10 thousand points, Beryl has had to maintain an average of 43.23 points per month or an average of 476 points a year for 21 years, which means that two out of every three slides entered must have received over the 20 point threshold where the points count toward the certificate. She is to be congratulated on her dedication to the club and the consistency of her excellent work with color slides.

On January 2, 1987, Beryl celebrated her 88th birthday.


JUDGING SEMINAR







This trip was made in preparation for the THAYER NORTH POLE EXPEDITION scheduled for 1989. Helen and husband Bill will ski and pull their own sleds the entire distance without support of dog teams, land machines or aircraft. Also on the expedition will be Charlie, a Newfoundland Husky mix, who also trains daily with Helen and Bill.

Bill is a helicopter pilot, having flown in several countries and in the rugged mountains in Alaska, a mountain climber, and athlete, having won a medal in luge in Europe. He will be the team navigator and will share the photographic chores with Helen.




Church, 3530 Colby Avenue, Everett.

A judge does not score his own slide, but places an X on his ballot, the alternate, who has a different colored pen, votes on all slides, except his own, although his score is not counted by the tabulator, except when one of the other judges has placed an X on his or her ballot. A record is kept for each member, and the certificate is given for each 500 point increment. This award is presented to the member at the annual Slide of the Year banquet, usually held in February of the following year.



ANNIE BERYL MCCOLLUM

A PILCHUCKER VIGNETTE

Annie Beryl Evans was born January 2, 1899, on a farm between the towns of Enumciaw and Buckley, Washington. The family moved to Sunnyside, just two miles from Marysville, Washington, where she attended Sunnyside grade school and the Marysville High School. After graduation she worked as Doctor Purdy's assistant doing bookkeeping, giving shots and administering medications.

After marriage to Gene Tupper in Everett in 1920, they moved to Snohomish, where he taught school and she worked in the Snohomish Grade School for Principal Emmett Smith.

In 1921 they moved to 4629 Seahurst, in what was then called Maple Heights, where she now lives. They spent that summer in a Forest Service lookout.

Beryl obtained employment at Paine Field where she worked for two and a half years. Gene taught at South Junior High School in Everett for 8 years. He passed away on March 6, 1931.

In 1950 Beryl married Ernest McCollum, who had taught school in Illinois, and now was doing bookkeeping. Ernest passed away in 1968. On January 14, 1965, Beryl joined the newly organized Pilchuck Camera Club. Over the years she has served the club as Telephone Committee in 1966; Treasurer 1968; Membership 1968; Treasurer 1969; Hospitality 1974; Membership 1974; Historian 1976 and Hospitality again in 1979.

Beryl is well known for her wonderful pictures of mushrooms and toadstools. She excels in their photography. Prints of numerous winning slides adorn her walls. Her work is a challenge for the rest of us to emulate.

The Pilchuck Camera Club's service award, The Nell Pierce Memorial Trophy for outstanding service to the club, was presented to Beryl at the February 1978 Slide of the Year Banquet.

In 1987 Beryl became the first member in the Pilchuck Camera Club to receive a 10,000 point Achievement Award Certificate, which she earned in monthly color slide competitions. All slides receiving twenty or more points out of a possible total of thirty points, count toward the Achievement Award. This presentation was made at the February 1988 Slide of the Year Banquet.

Beryl began traveling in 1979 when she took a bus trip to Alaska. Her second excursion was to South America in October 1979 with tour guide Ed Hume; next in June 1980, she traveled with tour leaders, Lee and Carol Mann of Sedro Woolley, to Africa.

By this time the travel bug had really gotten to her. Off she went in November 1980 to Australia and New Zealand with the East Snohomish County Senior Citizens, guided by Dee Jones.

Still searching for that elusive picture, she was off again on July 5, 1981. This time her itenary was for 21 days to Switzerland; Lake Como, Italy and France.

Here she goes again!! On September 15, 1982, she left on an 18 day photo junket, to China, shepherded by professional photographer Kenneth Weston, a former pastor of her church, The Church of God.

Sunshine is delicious, rain is refreshing, wind braces up, snow is exhilarating; there is no such thing as bad weather, only different kinds of good weather.
